Sławomir Lukaszewicz, Professor at the John Paul II Catholic University of Lublin in Poland, Visiting Scholar at the Davis Center for Russian and Eurasian Studies, Harvard University, USA, historian at the Institute of National Remembrance, Branch in Lublin, Poland, and Fulbright Senior Award 2019/2020 recipient. He has published widely on the history, politics, and political concepts of Polish and Central European Cold War exile, among others Third Europe: Polish Federalist Thought in the United States, 1940-1971s (2016), and with Piotr Kosicki Christian Democracy across the Iron Curtain – Europe Redefined (2018)

Patryk Babiracki, Associate Professor of Modern East-Central Europe, Poland and Russia at the University of Texas at Arlington. Author of „Soviet Soft Power in Poland: Culture and the Making of Stalin’s New Empire, 1943-1957”, the book that explores Soviet and Polish communists efforts to consolidate the new empire through broadly-understood international cultural initiatives. Presently working on a monograph tentatively called "Reinventing Poland: The Poznań International Fair, National Identity and the Rebellion of East European Peripheries, 1918-1990s."
